Political scientist



What you'll do

Your day-to-day will include tasks such as:

- Interpret and analyze policies, public issues, legislation, or the operations of governments, businesses, and organizations.
- Maintain current knowledge of government policy decisions.
- Evaluate programs and policies, and make related recommendations to institutions and organizations.
- Develop and test theories, using information from interviews, newspapers, periodicals, case law, historical papers, polls, or statistical sources.
- Collect, analyze, and interpret data such as election results and public opinion surveys, reporting on findings, recommendations, and conclusions.
- Write drafts of legislative proposals, and prepare speeches, correspondence, and policy papers for governmental use.
- Forecast political, economic, and social trends.
- Consult with and advise government officials, civic bodies, research agencies, the media, political parties, and others concerned with political issues.
- Disseminate research results through academic publications, written reports, or public presentations.

Working hours and environment

Most people say the following:

- Work With Work Group or Team: Important.
- Work Schedules: Regular (established routine, set schedule).
- Spend Time Sitting: More than half the time.
- Responsibility for Outcomes and Results: Limited responsibility.
- Freedom to Make Decisions: A lot of freedom.
- Duration of Typical Work Week: More than 40 hours.
- Coordinate or Lead Others: Fairly important.

Career path and progression

There are opportunities available in many types of organisation, including:

- central government – political researchers work in the main government departments (see government social research officer), as well as for the Scottish government
- local government departments – particularly social services, housing, education and chief executive
- large and small research agencies
- higher education institutions.

If you're working in higher education, you'll either be employed in a large research centre, which employs both permanent and fixed-term research staff, or a university teaching department, where researchers are often employed on fixed-term contracts of one or two years.

You'll need skills in:

- Reading Comprehension
- Speaking
- Active Listening
- Critical Thinking
- Writing

Entry requirements

Most employers will expect you to have the minimum of a good degree (2:1 or higher) in Politics.

Some of the large research agencies run graduate training schemes and you may need a 2:1 or above to be considered for a place.

If you want to work in the higher education sector, a PhD may be particularly useful as an advanced understanding of subject-specific academic methodology is often appreciated.

Daring to know in this subject:

- Consider reading both Macroeconomics and Microeconomics reading lists to further your understanding of the subject. Both lists include podcasts, further reading material and documentaries/videos to aid your study of Economics at A-Level.

Taking Economics further:

- University: Degrees in economics allow students to have the possibility of a career in the Financial Services Industry - this ranges from investment banking to accountancy and is a major part of the UK economy.
- Apprenticeships: These include major banks and financial service providers including insurance companies - but there are many other types of jobs available with economics.
- If you are studying/planning to study business/mathematics economics is a great addition as when combined with these courses, it is easier to access certain degrees and apprenticeships.


